Discussing Rationale (Slide 8)

- Overcoming the Busywork Dilemma: This article posits that students often
 perceive activities (e.g., peer and self assessment) as "busywork" and thus
 pointless, but that we can overcome this by justifying our pedagogical choices and
 constantly connecting them to the objectives of the course.
